NOTIFICATION IF NOT RETURNING TO ST PATRICK'S COLLEGE IN 2022

The College is currently developing classes for 2022. As part of the planning process, we ask that families notify the College if their child(ren), in Years 7-11, are not returning. This may be because they are transitioning to another educational institution or a workplace. This notification is required by Friday 24 September 2021. If notification is not received by this date, the 10-week late notification fee (as noted in the Terms and Conditions of Enrolment) will be imposed unless there are extenuating circumstances, such as students leaving for full-time employment. Waiving of this late fee will be approved at the discretion of the Principal.

CROAGH PARTICK UPDATE

SOLO CAMP

Our Solo Camps were conducted in Week 2 of this Term and once again provided our students with an important opportunity for enrichment and personal growth. The Solo is a Year 9 student's biggest challenge, taking them out of their comfort zone to help them learn more about themselves. Students are presented with the opportunity to just be, without the business of day to day activities, routines and digital technology. Our Solo Camp is a significant rite of passage in the sequence of The Rite Journey program.



In the text *Exploring the Power of Solo, Silence and Solitude*, research has shown that there are many positives to be gained by teenagers having this opportunity, with the following aspects being significant:

- Time of personal growth and increased trust in one's 'inner voice'.
- The peacefulness of a solo experience is a healthy, healing and rejuvenating encounter.
- Taking a break from the fast pace of life.
- Temporary 'reprieve' from the digital world.
- Being present to life.

Mr Steve Biddulph AM in his book, *Fully Human*, talks about rites of passage having clearly delineated steps, and perhaps the most important providing opportunity for the process of dying of our old self, so that we can be born into a new place. In this sense, students are offered the opportunity to think about their future and their place in the world. Students are challenged to think about questions, such as:

- What is holding me back in my life?
- What does each of my family members mean to me?
- What do I mean to them?

Students are also presented with the opportunity to write letters of gratitude to key members of their journey so far and reflect on the significant contributions people have made to help form the person they are today.

In solitude, we may find a new beginning and an opportunity to break old habits. In solitude, we may find increased sensitivity, compassion and empathy. In solitude, we may find the truth of ourselves, restore our dulled senses, and clarify and reorder our priorities. Above all, in solitude, we may find God, and come to bear that voice.



In speaking personally with one grandparent on the day, I was reminded of how special the relationships are for both the students and the grandparents. This particular grandparent reflected that as their grandchild grows




SENIOR ART EXHIBITION


