## Principal's Message

Welcome to Week 4 of Term 1.

Currently, I am reading a book called *The Resilience Shield* by Pronk, Pronk and Curtis. It examines resilience from an academic perspective and embeds it in the memories of the lives of SAS Servicemen.

What was interesting for me was how the authors explained the complexities of life and how we can develop resilience to deal with these difficult situations. To be more specific they discussed the difference between complicated and complex. For example, fixing a jet engine is considered complicated and you have to be highly skilled in order to fix it when it needs repairs, but there is a manual which identifies that if you replace this part and adjust that bolt you know exactly the consequence and outcome of your actions.

However, complex is different, for example, raising a teenager is considered extremely complex. There are so many different inputs to be considered and even then you still don't know how the teenager will react in different situations. Many would have heard of the Butterfly Effect where some experts believe the movement of the wings of a butterfly can affect the weather patterns halfway across the world.

So why have I introduced you to these concepts? Schools, similar to teenagers, are complex and the many thousands of decisions that are made can affect the community in different ways. One example of this is the lower than expected COVID-19 cases we have experienced in our College. Is this due to mask-wearing, encouraging opportunities to work outside, early release of the Middle School for breaks, the weather conditions or simply young people are more resilient to the virus?

Some predicted we would have at least 200 student and 20 staff cases by the end of the third week of school, but we are currently sitting at 15 active cases, including 14 students and one staff member. My message is simple – while we are proud of the current situation, due to the complexities of the system, we still need to be vigilant in keeping the virus at bay in our community. As cases drop it will be interesting to see how the powers that be reduce the restrictions going forward.

We have been pleased with the first four weeks of school with students seemingly quite settled and engaged in the energising life of the College. As I write this from the Senior School courtyard, it is pleasing to see students enjoying working outside and taking the opportunity to remove their masks. As I look up, I see pairs of Year 11 students doing trust activities in their MVPS class. It is quite odd seeing



students using their black face masks as blindfolds while another student directs them around the courtyard. There is another table where a teacher is providing extra help to a group of students doing Physical Science 3. The place is buzzing and is how a vibrant College should be.

Basketball, Cricket, Swimming, Tennis and Rowing are in full swing. In my next newsletter, I will discuss the benefits of our young people being involved in sporting activities and how they can develop many attributes that help navigate the joys and pitfalls of life beyond the gates.

Next week is Ash Wednesday, which marks the beginning of the most sacred times in the calendar of the Catholic Church. Ash Wednesday is the beginning of Lent and the Lenten period, while Easter Sunday celebrates the resurrection of our Christ Saviour. Lent is a time of reflection and sacrifice and at the College, our thoughts turn to the less fortunate in the world via support of Project Compassion donations in Tutor. All help in this regard is very much appreciated.

## MIDDLE SCHOOL NEWS

Middle School students have made a wonderful start to the 2022 school year. It has been heartening to see the way so many students have embraced the challenges presented to them which go beyond the obvious experiences of navigating a new environment, settling into a class of new faces and learning new schedules and processes. Of significance is the way in which students have adopted positive behaviours such as greeting and engaging in conversations and welcoming new people to the Middle School. So many students have endeavoured to make eye contact and extend warm and welcoming greetings, despite the challenge of faces being covered with masks. Purposefully greeting others was a challenge set for students at the commencement of the year and one they have visibly embraced, which has enhanced the positive atmosphere of the Middle School.

Outdoor spaces have been well utilised with students making the most of the recent warm weather and the inviting spaces. The Way of Saint Patrick Courtyard has not only been a popular gathering space during break times, but an extension of many classrooms with the area being used throughout the day to enable students to learn in a mask-free environment.

The Mindfulness Space has also been used by many either before school or throughout the day, enabling students to engage in mindfulness activities or to take a moment to reset. The Mindfulness Space offers a range of activities for Middle School students that support focused thinking in a calm environment. Middle School students are welcome to access the resources in the Mindfulness Space prior to Tutor each morning.

In recent weeks Middle School students have been actively engaged in activities and events focused on building connections with others. These have included classroom activities, Tutor group and House events and more significant opportunities such as Year 7 Connections Afternoon and the Middle School Swimming Carnival. Connections Afternoon enabled Year 7 students to gather in their Sub-House and work more closely with their House Head and their peers who are also members of their House. The afternoon involved learning about House Founders and House traditions, along with activities that support the

development of a greater connection with others. The Swimming Carnival was held at the Launceston Aquatic Centre on Friday 18 February and split into separate Year 7 and Year 8 events in line with Covid-safe requirements. Year 8 students began the day with traditional 50-metre races and novelty events such as the Shark Relay, Boat Race and the Late for School Race. Shorter distance races were also a highlight



as students completed a 25-metre swim, launching themselves from the blocks with an array of spectacular dives, bombs and bellyflops. House relays concluded the program with enthusiastic cheering, willing competitors on toward the finish. The Year 7 carnival events began after lunch and followed the same program. We were excited to see many talented swimmers in the competition pool and many enthusiastic novelty competitors braving the sharks with tenacity at the other end. All students are to be congratulated for their exemplary behaviour and fantastic contributions to these events. It has been pleasing to see students making the most of these opportunities despite the adjustments that had to be made for Covid-safe reasons.

The Year 7 Camp Adjusted Programs commence next week and although we are disappointed not to be offering the full camp experience for Year 7, we are looking forward to students being able to participate in the planned Camp Clayton and Trevallyn Reserve activities. These days will be wonderful opportunities for students to continue to make connections with their Core class peers and the staff working with them. Students are reminded to return all forms related to these activities to assist staff with planning.

Year 8 camps have been rescheduled for Week 8 of Term 1 and students will head off to camp locations with their Year 8 House groups and key House staff including their House Head. Students have had the opportunity to participate in camp planning meetings this week where they have begun to plan for their food and menu selections and camp groups. A follow-up meeting will take place in Week 6 to assist students in finalising plans.

With the commencement of many co-curricular and sporting activities in recent weeks it has been fantastic to see our Middle School students taking part in new opportunities and extending their experiences. While it may be the start of the year, Year 12 students need to start thinking about, researching, discussing, and planning what they are going to do next year. There are many pathways available, from university, TasTAFE, apprenticeships/traineeships, employment, Gap Year programs, ADF, Tasmania Police, Tasmania Fire Service, and more.

Students who are considering a university pathway whether it be a Diploma, Associate Degree or a Bachelor will need to be aware of timelines as early applications open.

ANU is the first of the universities to open their direct applications in March. UTAS's School Recommendation Program-Early applications open at the end of June with the mainland universities opening at the start of August.

#### AN UPDATE FROM ANU

ANU Direct Applications for 2023 entry will be opening soon. To assist students with the process, please take note of the following information.

#### ANU Applications open Wednesday 2 March and close Monday 23 May.

Students can start their application at any time and log back in as needed to complete the process.

A reminder to parents and guardians that Rapid Antigen Test kits (RATs) will be provided to students.

Initially, two kits were supplied, which were only used in the event that a student develops symptoms of COVID-19.

If a student develops symptoms while at school, parents and guardians will be called to collect their child and the test is to be taken at home. (A RAT kit will be supplied if the kits previously supplied have been used.)

Each test kit contains the following components:

- 1x test device (Test Cassette)
- 1x nasal swab
- 1x extraction tube
- Instruction sheet

#### **REASONABLE ADJUSTMENTS FOR STUDENTS** WITH AN IMPAIRMENT, DISABILITY, DISORDER OR MEDICAL CONDITION

The Tasmanian Assessment, Standards and Certification (TASC) provides students with Reasonable Adjustments to support equitable access and opportunities in the completion of their senior secondary studies and assessments. These adjustments are made with the intention of enabling a student to demonstrate the required knowledge, skills and standards of the courses they are undertaking; thus supporting equitable access and participation. The adjustments provide equity and fairness for all students, while preserving the integrity of the assessment process.

TASC considers that the following grounds for eligibility for Reasonable Adjustments are:

- 1. Formal Diagnosis condition, impairment, or disability (as defined in the Disability Discrimination Act, 1992). This includes, but not limited to:
  - Physical disability
  - Vision impairment
  - Hearing impairment
  - Medical condition
  - Psychological disorder
  - Specific learning disorder
- 2. Misadventure (e.g. injury, accident).
- 3. Refugee student status (length of time in Australia).
- 4. Personal circumstances (causing a disruption to schooling or cultural obligations e.g. death of a close family member, religious obligations).

Further details are available on the Office of Tasmanian Assessment, Standards and Certification Website, Reasonable Adjustments Policy at https://www.tasc.tas.gov.au

Applications need to be submitted to TASC by St Patrick's College by the end of Term 2, 2022. The College will commence the application process in March of Term 1, 2022 to ensure it is fully prepared by the due date and also to enable Reasonable Adjustments to be in place for all internal assessments and tasks. Students in Year 12 who had Reasonable Adjustments granted in 2021, will automatically receive the same in 2022 and do not need to reapply.

Please be aware that formal written supporting evidence from a medical or mental health professional is required for an application based on a formal diagnosis of a condition, impairment or disability. This will outline the condition and describe the Reasonable Adjustments requested. In the case of refugee status, a copy of the visa will be required. For a misadventure application, the evidence could be in the form of a medical certificate, a statutory declaration, a police report or death certificate.

Please be aware that some students will need to undergo further psychoeducational assessment. Further information regarding this requirement can be obtained from Ms Alexa Headlam, Senior Psychologist - Student Wellbeing Support Services.

Please contact Mr Ryan Wiese, Director of Curriculum - -Senior School or Ms Alexa Headlam, Senior Psychologist as soon as possible if you believe your young person may be entitled to Reasonable Adjustments for exams and/or assessments for TASC Level 3 and 4 subjects.

Due to COVID-related number restrictions at the pool,

we had to again split the day into two halves - Year 8s followed by Year 7s, so here's hoping next year we can go back to a full day for all.

Thanks to all the staff involved for making it a great day and thanks to Mr Tony Cullen for the staffing which must be difficult for a split day. A big thank you to my co-organiser Mr Will von Stieglitz for his contributions to the event including a new sign-up system which worked very well.

To the results:-

In 1990, my first year coaching the 1st XI, we played St Virgil's in a thrilling State Final, on our old oval, that went down to the final hour. After scoring 235 we bowled them out for 195. The 40 run victory equalled what we had scored for our 10th wicket partnership on day one!

Our wicketkeeper was Nick McGann, who went on to win multiple premierships with Launceston CC. St Virgil's main batsman was Michael Di Venuto, who went on to play for Tasmania and Australia (in ODIs) and is the current Australian batting coach.

On Saturday we incredibly played our first senior game against St Virgil's for 28 years, as 1994 was the year before Guilford Young College became the Years 11/12 college down south.

St Virgil's now have Nick and Michael's sons, Joe (c) and Luca, in the team. Coached by Mark Waddington, a former St Patrick's Ballarat teacher and coach in our exchanges for the HT Breach Cup, their young players are in good hands as they resume in the State-wide 1st XI roster, on their way to resuming as a Year 7-12 college.

St Virgil's won the toss and batted steadily to reach 0-24, before the accurate Hamish Bateman claimed the initial breakthrough, and was quickly backed up by Ryan Arnott. Our ability to attack the stumps paid dividends as we had their top six all bowled or LBW on their way to being 6-46. After not playing for two months, as his broken finger healed, Tom Chambers gleefully returned and was soon taking wickets with his beautifully flighted leggies. Mason Visser added three wickets of his own and their innings was over.

After lunch, we were able to chase the required 80 in only 13 overs, without losing a wicket, thanks to the excellent partnership between Max Symons and Will Siemsen.

#### STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS 19-20 February 2022


A number of students became State Champions over the weekend, amongst the competition with other schools and rowing clubs with seasoned and state-level abilities.
