# Principal's Message

It hardly seems reasonable with just over half the year gone, we are now planning for 2023. Already we are seeing students and parents meeting with selected staff who are experts in their subject field. The subject selection process has changed considerably since I first arrived, when parents were not invited to be part of the decision making process. There were always parents involved, but that number was small compared to the engagement we have today. It is now a collective decision which can only benefit the student.

In the past we also had a large number of students who thought the grass would be greener in the Department of Education colleges for Years 11 and 12. One of the pleasing changes that has occurred over the past six years is a focus on improving the student Year 10 transition into the Senior School, and now we have very few wishing to transfer to another college at the end of Year 10. With the new legislation stating that students must be studying, or in apprenticeship, this has ensured that the College has a diverse range of courses that cater for the students' preferences.

While subject selection for Year 11 and 12 can to some extent shape a student's future, I have a totally different view when it comes to picking electives for Years 7 to 10. Core subjects prepare the students well for nearly all senior subjects, so I encourage students to pick subjects that they enjoy or are foreign to them to expose them to a diverse range of skills and interests.

I certainly thought my days writing about COVID were in the past, however having to cancel the Winter Concert due to illness was extremely disappointing, however unavoidable due to the illness of staff involved.

We encourage all families to enjoy an evening of jazz and support our students who will be performing with James Morrison on Saturday 20 August.

#### 2023 MARTIN-LYALL SCHOLARSHIP

The Martin-Lyall Scholarship arose from the generosity of the late Mrs Rosemary Gleeson-West in memory of her parents, Mr Athol Winton Martin and Mrs Maida Kathleen Lyall, who both lived and worked in Tasmania.

Sadly, Mrs Gleeson-West passed away in 2016, however it was her wish to continue the scholarship via her Estate. Mrs Gleeson-West had a great affinity for both the Tasmania and St Patrick's College communities and her generosity will always be fondly remembered. # NOTIFICATION OF STUDENT ABSENCES

Under the *Education Act 2016*, the parent or guardian of a school-aged child must ensure their child/ren attends each school day.

Students are required to attend all classes, Tutor, Home Group and Pastoral Care programs, Retreats, Reflection Days, Sporting Carnivals, College Camps and other College activities during the school term.

If students are unable to attend, parents/guardians are required to provide formal notification and the reason for the absence.

#### SHORT TERM ABSENCES

Where a student requires a short-term absence, a parent/guardian must advise the College by phoning 6341 9988; emailing absent@stpatricks.tas.edu.au; or using the Schoolbox App prior to 9:30am on the day of absence.

Parents/Guardians making the absence notification will receive a confirmation receipt to their mobile by 10:30am.

If the College has not been notified of a student's absence, a message will be sent to the parent/guardian's mobile by 10:30am. Parents/Guardians must contact the College as a priority after they receive this message.

#### EXTRAORDINARY & LONG-TERM ABSENCES (5 OR MORE CONSECUTIVE SCHOOL DAYS)

The College recognises that students participate in non-College activities and events that are of considerable educational and personal value to them, such as playing representative sport at national or international level or participating in cultural experiences.

Where a student is required to be absent from the College for these events for a period of five days or more, the parent/guardian must seek permission from the Principal by emailing principal@stpatricks.tas.edu.au or in writing. The Principal will consider the request at their discretion and notify the parent/guardian.

Under the *Education Act 2016*, the Principal is not authorised to formally approve any unauthorised absences during the school term, including family holidays.

When a student experiences illness, injury or family emergency that requires them to be absent for an extended period, staff will work with the family to provide appropriate ongoing education and support.

# SUBJECT INFORMATION EVENINGS

#### YEAR 10 PATHWAY PLANNING INTERVIEWS

Year 10 students and parents/ guardians have been invited to make an appointment to attend a Year 10 Pathway Planning interview with their child. These interviews provide an opportunity to discuss career options and possible pathways and give a more detailed and personalised explanation of the TCE and ATAR and how each student can optimise their subject choices, including TASC subject choices and VET opportunities at the College in Years 11 and 12. These interviews have been occurring over the first three weeks of Term 3 in the lead-up to Subject Information Evening in Week 4 of Term 3. You only need to book one appointment as each staff member involved covers the same information.

These interviews are designed for Year 11 students who need some support and guidance to assist them with their subject selections.



# **CHIEF ECONOMIST SHARES INSIGHTS**

In Term 2, students studying Economics had the rare opportunity to speak with AMP Capital's Chief Economist and Head of Investment Strategy Dr Shane Oliver. Dr Oliver walked us through his typical day as an economist, always starting by catching up on what overseas markets have done overnight. He follows this by reading the Financial Review before discussing the intricacies of keeping up to date with economic affairs that impact the decision-making components of AMP's investments. The students are currently working through the ideas of economic management and the difficulties governments face when striving to achieve the key economic outcomes of strong and stable growth, low and stable inflation, low unemployment, external stability, environmental sustainability, and equitable distribution of income. The opportunity was taken to provide the students with a professional setting in the College's boardroom to talk shop.

In early May, with the Reserve Bank of Australia (RBA) deliberating on whether

or not to raise the target cash rate for the first time in over a decade, Dr Oliver spoke to students about the competing goals of the RBA in keeping inflation low and promoting economic prosperity. Inflationary expectations took centre stage as public enemy number one. On the one hand, raising the cash rate target so significantly signals that the RBA is serious about containing inflation, leading consumers to put off spending now as prices will stabilise in the future, and to reduce borrowing by making it more expensive to pay back in the future. On the other hand, large household debts accrued in the last few years of

historically low-interest rates will now be considerably more expensive to pay back, reducing disposable income for a significant number of Australians impacting their living standards.

The impact of Russia's invasion of Ukraine and the resulting energy shortage, as well as China's 'Zero Covid' policy on the Australian economy, were all covered. All students enjoyed the experience and gained some valuable insights into economics and the economy from Dr Shane Oliver and we are all grateful for the experience.

# STUDENTS SHINE IN AUSTRALIAN GEOGRAPHY COMPETITION

Geography students tested their geographical skills and knowledge against students from around Australia in the 2022 Australian Geography Competition.

The HaSS Faculty is pleased to advise that St Patrick's College came first in Tasmania in the Australian Geography Competition held earlier in the year.

A huge thank you to all teachers for supporting student participation in this and especially to all Geography teachers for nominating students for the competition. Individual certificates will be distributed to teachers to pass on to students so they can celebrate their involvement and success.

The College had a number of student geographers who performed very well in the Competition this year with three students gaining high distinctions and three students distinctions.

This year's College achievement follows Ayrton Fry's 2020 individual success in being the first in Tasmania for Year 11 and the individual success of Sophie Roberts (current Year 12) being invited to the Gold Coast earlier this year to be part of the Geography Big Week Out.

As a result of achieving 'First in Tasmania', the College was awarded a \$100 book voucher from Booktopia.

Nearly 70,000 students from across Australia entered the Australian Geography Competition, so the result gives us an external benchmark as to how our students are going in certain aspects of Geography. Rachel Honey, the Competition's National Coordinator said, "The Competition aims to encourage student interest in geography and to reward student excellence".

"Geography is such an important subject because it brings together the physical and human dimensions of our environment, helping students to develop a deeper understanding of our world and the challenges it faces," said Ms Honey.

The Competition is a joint initiative of the Australian Geography Teachers' Association and the Royal Geographical Society of Queensland. Funding to support the Competition and Australia's team in the Olympiad is provided by the Australian Department of Education, Skills and Employment, the University of Melbourne and the University of New South Wales.

# INVESTIGATION PROJECT RESEARCH SESSIONS FOR SENIOR STUDENTS



In Term 3, senior students studying level 3 Psychology, Sociology, and English Literature, as well as students of other subjects, will be working on their major Investigation Projects (IPs) and folios. Every year the Mary MacKillop Library offers these students one-on-one research sessions focusing on their individual topic. We help students develop their library, database and internet research skills which gives them a solid starting point for their IP and helps them focus on the direction their experiment, survey or study will take.

These sessions usually last a double period, either during a study line or during class time for the related subject after negotiating with the teacher, and they are extremely valuable. We look at how to access and use databases of academic journals, a range of pre-tertiary level textbooks and resources and any other credible research to help our students build their literature reviews and research methods, and we also often workshop the IP question of focus.

These sessions must be booked in advance. Come to the circulation desk in the Library to book in as soon as possible. We also provide referencing and research help for all assignments, portfolios and projects. Come in and ask us!

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# **COMMUNITY SUPPORT FOR MAGNOLIA PLACE**



Girls 1sts had a 4-nil loss to Grammar on Monday. Games for all our senior teams rostered for yesterday became washouts.



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

#### **Commonwealth School Data Collection Notice**

The Australian Government Department of Education, Skills and Employment (the department) would like to advise all parents and guardians that it collects certain information about your child's school, its staff, and student body.

#### Why is this information collected?

This information is collected by the department in accordance with the *Australian Education Act 2013* (the Act) and the *Australian Education Regulation 2013* (the Regulation). The Act and the Regulation require the legal entity responsible for the administration of the school (the approved authority) to provide certain information to the department. The department collects this information to:

- Ensure the provision of Australian Government funding to schools is properly calculated and appropriately managed.
- Conduct research, statistical analysis and develop school education policy for the Australian Government.
- Meet national and international reporting obligations on school students in Australia.
- Publish and provide information about schools to the public.

#### How is information collected?

Information is provided to the department by a school or their approved authority via various data collections on the <u>SchoolsHUB website</u>.

#### What information is collected?

Each data collection fulfils a separate reporting requirement. The data collections conducted through SchoolsHUB are:

- The Student Residential Address and Other Information Collection (Address Collection) provides student residential addresses (excluding student names), and the names and addresses of parents/guardians of students for eligible full or part-time primary and secondary students enrolled at most non-government schools.
- The Financial Accountability (FA) assurance activity is done to certify that the financial assistance provided by the Australian Government for schools has been spent or committed to be spent to provide school education.
- **The Financial Questionnaire (FQ)** reports the income, expenditure, assets and liabilities from all non-government Australian schools receiving Australian Government recurrent grant funding.
- Student Attendance (STATS) provides a school's student attendance rate data by grade, gender and Indigeneity from non-government schools for full-time students in Years 1 to 10 attending regular and special schools.
- The Non-Government Schools Census (Census) provides information about the number and characteristics of the school's staff and student body during a specific reference period. Characteristics include student year level and workload, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander staff and students, students with disability, students receiving distance education, boarding students, and overseas students. The names of students and staff are not collected, apart from

the name, position and contact details of the staff member nominated as the primary contact for the annual Census.

• **Census Special Circumstances Applications** may also be made by schools to include a student/s who did not attend during the Census reference period but otherwise meets Census eligibility requirements. Schools will provide the department with information and documents about the student demonstrating their eligibility. The department does not require information that personally identifies a student and asks schools to de-identify any documents before providing them.

#### How will the information be used and disclosed?

Some of the information collected by the department from schools in accordance with the Act and the Regulation, may be 'personal information' for the purposes of the *Privacy Act 1988* (Privacy Act). Personal information is protected by law, including under the Privacy Act. Any use or disclosure of your personal information must occur in accordance with the Regulation. Personal information is information about an identifiable individual. Personal information includes an individual's name and contact details.

Personal information collected by the department may be used or disclosed for the following:

- Used by the department to review school funding calculations and develop school education policy.
- Used or disclosed where it is otherwise required or authorised by law, including under the Act or Regulation, or otherwise permitted under the Privacy Act.
- Disclosed to the Australian Bureau of Statistics to calculate your non-government school community's capacity to contribute to the costs of schooling (Address Collection only).
- Disclosed to the Australian Curriculum Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) to publish on the <u>My School website</u> and include as high-level data for ACARA's National Report on Schooling in Australia and the Productivity Commission Report on Government Services (Census and STATS only).
- Disclosed to State and Territory education departments and authorities in accordance with the Act.
- Disclosed to a contracted auditor where the department decides to audit or verify the information
  provided by an approved authority about a school. The contracted auditor may use previously
  collected information or request access to individual student records for comparison purposes. The
  contractors may pass this information onto officers within the department, if there is a discrepancy
  in the data provided by the school and the school's records and further investigation is required.
  The contracted auditor must handle personal information in accordance with the Privacy Act.
- Disclosed to its service providers for the purposes of the provision of information and communications technology (ICT) support services to the department.
- Other than in exceptional circumstances (for example, investigation of fraud relating to overseas students), the department does not disclose any of the personal information collected to overseas recipients.

When student information is provided to the department by schools or approved authorities, the department requests that the information must not explicitly identify any student. For example, student names or student identifiers are not provided. To help protect your child's privacy, we support schools to submit their reporting requirements using de-identified records.

In limited cases, even without student names or identifiers, a student may be reasonably identifiable from the information provided (for example, because of the small size of a particular school). In this event, the disclosure of such personal information to the department by a school, and the collection of that personal information by the department, are both required and authorised by law for the purposes of the Privacy Act.

#### What do you need to do?

You do not need to do anything. Your school is responsible for providing the requested information to the department.
